





It is a time to increase in good deeds, strengthen our character, and show kindness and generosity to others. We encourage all Muslims to make the most of this blessed month by upholding patience, respect, and compassion towards others.

We recognise the difference of opinion among *Imāms* regarding Moonsighting and urge all Muslims to acknowledge these differences and avoid disputes that may lead to disunity within the Muslim community in Australia.



Key Achievements to Date:

- Audited the membership list and issued membership cards.
- Completed NBN connections and initiated the setup of 2 VOIP phones.
- Secured an 18% discount on utility bills.
- Audited water bills since 2020, resulting in the College in taking responsibility for their usage.
- Prioritized ongoing maintenance with enhanced safety measures.
- Upgraded office IT equipment and transferred data to the cloud.
- Upgraded first aid kits.
- Conducted first aid courses for approximately 25 brothers and sisters.
- Successfully organized an SGM for the funeral parlor and presented the outcome at the AGM.
- Upgraded carpark lighting and office switchboards.
- Distributed overdue zakat via individual branches.
- Implemented an asset register and risk registers.
- Implemented a General Secretary and MLNSW dashboard.
- Began introducing a salat countdown system, pending wiring requirements in the mosque
- Compiled a supplier list.
- Audited and implemented a system for the bookshop.
- Upgraded carpark line marking, introducing disabled carpark spots and a loading zone
- Rectified issues with overdue carpark asphalt and potholes—hazard and risk report.
- Upgraded windows tinting for better room temperature conditions.
- Introduction of a fixed-line sound microphone system in the Masjid for both the Imam and the Muazzin. This new system aims to enhance the clarity and reach of their voices, ensuring that everyone in the congregation can hear the prayers and announcements clearly.



Future and Ongoing Activities:

- Upgrading the men's pergola.
- Upgrading the ladies' pergola with automatic blinds.
- Planning the 40th anniversary celebration—details to follow.
- Engaging seniors and youth for mental health and wellbeing programs.
- Upgrading mosque interior lighting.
- Upgrading the commercial kitchen.
- Upgrading the ladies' washroom.
- Introducing storage space for the masjid, including a cleaners' room.
- Transforming the Shura Council House into a potential league office area, including state-ofthe-art meeting rooms with a capacity of up to 16 people, hot desk arrangements, and upgraded amenities.
- Finalizing policies and procedures with drafts completed by the IEB 2024.
- Invest into a nursing home and also a seniors citizen centre

Financial Strength and Stewardship


The 2024 Audited Financial Report was presented at our Annual General Meeting (AGM) in March 2025, highlighting the League's continued financial stability and growth.

In 2024, the League made substantial progress in reducing its financial obligations, particularly in paying off the loan for our property at 268 Catherine Fields Road, Catherine Field, held with Islamic

Co-Operative Finance Australia Limited (ICFAL). As of 31 December 2024, the outstanding loan balance stood at \$805,555, a notable reduction from \$1,138,888 in 2023.

These financial milestones reflect the trust and generosity of our members and the broader community, who continue to support our mission through Masjid donations, Zakat, Fitrana, and Sadaqah contributions. The introduction of Tap-and-Go and EFTPOS facilities has further streamlined the donation process, making it easier for members to contribute. 

Each year Muslims around the world anticipate the arrival of the holiest month of the year — RAMADHAN! The word "Ramadan" comes from the Arabic root word for "parched thirst" and "sun-baked ground." It is expressive of the hunger and thirst felt by those who spend the month in fasting. Through fasting, a Muslim sympathizes with those in the world who have little to eat every day especially Muslim in the oppressed and War-torn countries like Gaza, Burma, Lebanon and so forth. Our heartfelt duas go out to the innocent children who have lost their parents, families and friends. May Allah swt give them solace and quality life, give them good health and uplift their spirits. Muslims all around the World should assist them wholeheartedly. Our Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) once said, "A man's wealth is never diminished by charity) so please dig deep and be generous!

During Ramadan, the ninth month of the Islamic calendar the annual fast is considered one of the five "pillars" of Islam. Muslims who are physically able are required to fast each day of the entire month from sunrise to sunset. <u>Surah Al Qadr</u>: Indeed, we sent the Qur'an down during the Night of Decree <u>Laylatul Qadr!</u> And what can make you know what is the Night of Decree? a night in which angels descend to earth with a myriad of tasks, leading to a night of peace, blessings and divine guidance (qadar) until dawn.

In the blessed month of Ramadhan with devotion and self-control, a Muslim practices good manners, good speech, and good habits. Through changing routines, we get a chance to establish self-discipline, healthy lifestyle habits particularly with regards to good health and diet.

Upon sighting of the Crescent, Muslims adorn themselves and gather early in the morning in outdoor locations or mosques to perform the Eid prayer. This consists of a sermon followed by a short congregational prayer. After the Eid prayer people scatter to visit family and friends, give gifts (especially to children) and indulge in grand feasting. These activities traditionally continue for more than three days.

While Eid is an occasion for joy, gaiety and celebration we must not, however, forget those in need, those who may be sick or struck with grief. Our prayers are with some near and dear friends and relatives who lost their loved ones recently and those who are overcome by unforeseen mishaps or calamities. May Allah (SWT) the most Merciful, the Sustainer, the Cherisher relieve them from their pain and suffering and grant them good health.

In every shared smile, laughter and in every silent prayer answered, in every opportunity that comes your way, may Allah (swt) reward you and bless you all immensely. Ameen.





Life-Saving Skills: Muslim League's Free First Aid Training Initiative

The Muslim League of NSW continues its commitment to community wellbeing with a comprehensive First Aid Training Day held on February 22, 2025. The free event, which took place at the Green Valley Masjid, brought together community members of all ages for essential lifesaving skills education.

The day-long program was designed to accommodate both male and female participants, with separate sessions ensuring cultural sensitivity while maximizing participation. Professional paramedics and certified first aid instructors conducted the training, providing expert guidance throughout the hands-on workshops.

"First aid knowledge is crucial for every household," explained Haji Ayub Khan, League. "In emergency situations, the first few minutes can make the difference between life and death. Our goal is to equip as many community members as possible with these critical skills."

Participants learned fundamental life-saving techniques including CPR, managing choking incidents, treating burns, addressing bleeding emergencies, and recognizing signs of stroke and heart attack. The training incorporated practical demonstrations followed by supervised practice sessions using mannequins and simulated emergency scenarios.

One of the participant's Br Mukhtar found the training invaluable: "I've wanted to learn proper first aid for years and now I feel confident I could help if situations arise.

The training also addressed specific community concerns, with a section dedicated to managing medical emergencies during large gatherings like Eid celebrations, community festivals, and mosque gatherings. Practical advice on creating designated first aid stations and establishing emergency response protocols for community events was shared with organizational leaders in attendance. Each participant received a certificate of completion.

"This is just the beginning," said Haji Ayub Khan, President of the Muslim League of NSW. "Based on today's overwhelming response, we're planning quarterly first aid sessions throughout 2025, including specialized courses for parents of young children and for those caring for elderly family members."

The initiative represents part of the League's broader community resilience program, which aims to build self-sufficiency and emergency preparedness within culturally and linguistically diverse communities across New South Wales.



Monthly Program

The Muslim League of NSW has established a remarkable monthly program that serves as a cornerstone for Islamic education and community building. This initiative brings together respected Islamic scholars and community members in an atmosphere of learning and fellowship that benefits Muslims from diverse backgrounds.

Recognizing the importance of inclusion, the organizers have thoughtfully arranged for dedicated spaces for female attendees, ensuring that women can participate comfortably and fully benefit from the spiritual and educational content. This commitment to accessibility reflects the program's underlying philosophy that Islamic knowledge should be available to all members of the community regardless of gender.

The monthly gatherings culminate in a shared meal, with dinner provided for all participants. This aspect of the program transforms what might otherwise be a purely educational event into a true community experience, allowing attendees to forge connections, discuss the evening's teachings, and strengthen the bonds of brotherhood and sisterhood.

None of this would be possible without the generous support of sponsors who understand the value of religious education and community cohesion. Their contributions enable the Muslim League of NSW to offer these enriching programs without placing financial burdens on attendees, making spiritual growth and community connection accessible to all.

Community Volunteer Effort: Annual Stock take at Muslim League Bookshop

The Muslim League of NSW kicked off 2025 with its annual bookshop stock take, bringing together dedicated volunteers for a comprehensive inventory assessment of the community's valued literary resource. The stock take, conducted during the first week of January, represents an important administrative function that helps ensure the bookshop continues to serve as a vital hub for Islamic literature, educational materials, and cultural resources.

"Our annual stock take is much more than just counting books," explains Abul, the bookshop's manager. "It's an opportunity to evaluate our collection, identify gaps in our offerings, and plan our acquisitions for the coming year based on community needs and interests."

The process involved a systematic review of over 5,000 titles ranging from religious texts and Quranic studies to children's books, contemporary fiction by Muslim authors, and educational resources. Volunteers worked in teams, methodically checking physical inventory against digital records, updating the catalogue system, and assessing the condition of existing stock.

"I was part of the audit team this year, and it was an eye-opening experience," shares one dedicated volunteer. "Beyond simply counting books, we discussed which titles were most popular with readers, identified damaged items needing replacement, and suggested new categories based on requests we've received throughout the past year."

The stock take revealed several interesting trends in community reading habits. Children's Islamic literature continues to be among the fastest-moving categories, reflecting parents' commitment to nurturing religious identity in younger generations. Additionally, there has been growing interest in books addressing contemporary issues from an Islamic perspective, including mental health resources, environmental stewardship, and navigating digital technology.

"What makes our bookshop special is that it's not just a retail space, but a community resource," notes Ibrahim Malik, Muslim League's Education Coordinator. "The stock take helps us ensure we're fulfilling that mission effectively."

Following the inventory completion, volunteers participated in a reorganization of the shop floor, creating more intuitive browsing sections and highlighting seasonal recommendations. The team also identified outdated technology references and educational materials that needed updating, creating a strategic acquisition list for 2025.

"Volunteering for the stock take is my way of supporting multiple community initiatives at once. "It's satisfying to know that my few days of inventory work helps sustain programs that benefit everyone from children to seniors throughout the year."

The Muslim League bookshop is open six days a week and welcomes donations of gently used Islamic and educational books.

The facility director, explained how the residence incorporates halal dining options, prayer times into daily routines, and employs staff familiar with Islamic customs. "Our approach focuses on dignity and respect while maintaining cultural connections that are vital for emotional wellbeing," while leading the group through the facility's garden designed for both recreation and therapeutic horticulture.

The day concluded with a communal lunch featuring traditional dishes. This social gathering proved to be a highlight, with animated conversations filling the community hall as attendees shared stories and strengthened bonds.

"These excursions are vital for combating isolation among our senior men," explained Haji Ayub Khan, Interim President of the Muslim League. "Regular social interaction has proven benefits for mental and physical health, especially for those who may have lost spouses or live alone."

The organization welcomes community support and volunteers for future events focused on senior wellbeing.

4. Music and Poetry: A Melodic Heritage



Minarah College Catherine Field

Minarah College will be a co-educational Kindergarten to Year 12 school, with classrooms and facilities to be future-focused and purpose built to prepare students for the future.

The proposed school at 268–278
Catherine Fields Road is being developed to function as the second campus of Minarah College Green Valley Campus, one of the top performing schools in Liverpool based on NAPLAN results.

A State Significant Development Application (SSDA) for the new campus was originally submitted to the NSW Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure in 2022.

After careful consideration of community feedback, Minarah College lodged an amended application, reducing the total number of students from 1,580 to 980.

The amended proposal was placed on public submission in September/October 2024 and it is continuing to be assessed by the Department in 2025.

Once the SSDA is approved, Minarah College will deliver the new school in a staged approach.

Stage 1: 2026, 318 students and 15 staff. Stage 2: 2031, 652 students and 33 staff. Stage 3: 2035, 980 students and 51 staff.



The new school will feature:

- An Early Learning Centre for 60 students.
- School for Specific Purpose for 30 students.
- Primary School accommodating 505 students.
- High School for 385 students.
- On-site parking with 96 parking spaces and a dedicated dropoff/pick-up area.
- Amenities including a library, canteen, a primary school hall, high school hall and a sports field.
- Site access from Catherine Fields Road at two different points.
